### BRING COOKIES


We are going to have cookies for sale during the show Saturday. I need several volunteers to bring cookies. They

# Show and Tell




Fred Carter used Eastern cottonwood bark for this large carving. It is thin, the type that grows in Texas. He used Northern cottonwood for the two smaller houses. The one with the large tree next to it was carved in Rick Jensen's class a few years ago.



Ronnie Boston carved the Indian war shield and made the frame for it. The shields had trade cloths hung over the outside. He woodburned the carved feathers he hung from the shield.




Fred Stratton carved this Santa from a piece of hard "petrified" wood that Lorraine gave him. He used a wood stain for the painting.






Dallas Deege showed his carved chains. He showed his carved hands from a hand study he is doing in his classes now.




Leroy Miller showed his first effort at burning hardwood with instructor Carolyn Smith. It is a box cover. He said "thanks to Carolyn or it would be firewood."





Mike Crossson did these 2 carvings under instruction of professional carver Dimitrios Klitsos. He is a European style carver that uses chisels. He carved 12 hours a day in the class. The relief carvings are leaves and grapes. The instructor carved examples and he carved the rest. Mike also showed us his clock design that he plans to carve with acanthus leaves in relief.



Kenan Schultz showed us his bear he carved in Chinese Tallow found wood. This is his fifth bear and will go to his mother-in-law. He found that when using the chain saw, it is very important to have control.



Berny Alvarez sent these photos to Lorraine Lewis recently. He is pictured in his backyard where he has several very large carvings. As you see, Berny has been doing lots of carving.
